## Beyond the Gifts

You ever see the joy of Christmas quickly turn into anxiety as the New Year begins knocking at the door? Why is that? Maybe it's because we did such a good job of anchoring ourselves to a few weeks of garland, trees, dinners, snacks and gift giving that we forgot to deeply connect ourselves to Christ Himself during that time. Sure, we invited Him into the process and welcomed Him in, but how much of that was according to our terms? How many of us continued covering our daily burdens with all the activity, yet were too afraid to cast our cares and anxieties on Him? Then here comes January 1st again and all our lives, responsibilities, decisions and reality kicks back into full gear.

I believe the reason so many of us feel the insecurities and anxiousness around this time of the year is because we have distracted ourselves enough with all those gifts and festivities that were meant to bring us closer to God, and found a false hope, strength and purpose that Only God Himself can give.

There is so much that I could share from my own walk to try and tie this all together, but I believe that King David did a beautiful job of summing up what we should do as we move forward this year. When David found himself with a dry spirit and an anxious soul He knew exactly where he needed to go. At his lowest moments in life, where life was bleak and shaky, and the future carried more questions and anxiety than it did answers and joy, David did not turn to a new gym membership, or goal-setting. He found himself dragging himself to the only well that ever satisfied his quenching soul.

### Psalm 143:3-6

**3 For the enemy has pursued my soul;  
he has crushed my life to the ground;  
he has made me sit in darkness like those long dead.**  
**4 Therefore my spirit faints within me;  
my heart within me is appalled.**  
**5 I remember the days of old;  
I meditate on all that you have done;  
I ponder the work of your hands.**  
**6 I stretch out my hands to you;  
my soul thirsts for you like a parched land. Selah**  
**7 Answer me quickly, O Lord!  
My spirit fails!  
Hide not your face from me,  
lest I be like those who go down to the pit.**  
**8 Let me hear in the morning of your steadfast love,  
for in you I trust.  
Make me know the way I should go,  
for to you I lift up my soul.**

If you find yourself in a place filled with fear, or anxiety about the future, and in need of your soul to be quenched, let these things lead you to God. I promise He will provide you with all the grace you need in the new year. Note I did not say “what we think we need”, but what God sees we need. David cries that very thought out in this Psalm. God will give us strength, but it is not our own. He will pour out hope, but there may be a cost. He will bring us clarity, but not control, and glory, but not for ourselves but for Himself.

Today we measure strength out of meals we eat, sleep we get or health of our earthly body. I believe no strength is more important than spiritual power, the ability to persevere through the trials around us and the resolve to battle through temptation and sin. Here David shows us that when we run out of own resources, we should be humble enough to stretch out our hands to the One Who has always battled for us and cared for us so many times before.

David faced many difficult decisions as a king, but here in this Psalm he is on the run. He needed wisdom and discernment consistently in his life, but even more so in this dangerous time of his life. While we are not kings, we are a people living in a difficult time. The clarity we need these days will involve some planning and budgeting for sure. The most important piece of seeking clarity as we move forward this year should center around lifting our eyes up to God, knowing Him and His word intimately, and waiting on Him in prayer; when we do this well, we will deepen our joy in Him.

Joy can be so elusive when we try and make it just about us. Our deepest happiness and joy should be seen and felt in being liberated by God and in living in that truth. It's not about us. It is always about God. David figured that out, too. He ended Psalm 143 like this :

***11 For your name's sake, O Lord, preserve my life!  
In your righteousness bring my soul out of trouble!  
12 And in your steadfast love you will cut off my enemies,  
and you will destroy all the adversaries of my soul,  
for I am your servant.***

In other words, “*Show the world how merciful and generous and powerful You can be. Make Your name great through me!*” Even when David pleads for deliverance and safety, he wants God, not David, to be glorified. This time of year is a great time for all of us to remember why we exist. When we do, we can refocus any part of our lives that is not living around that purpose. If your soul thirsts, reach out to the living water that will satisfy you this year.

## Then and Now

As I mentioned in one of the past newsletters, the idea of a new building known as Central Park Christian Church was birthed in the midst of a world pandemic.

The year was 1920. The entire world was in upheaval. everyone was dealing with the affects of the Spanish flu epidemic. It is estimated that about 500 million people or one-third of the world's population became infected with this virus. The number of deaths are estimated to be at least 50 million worldwide with about 675,000 occurring in the United States.

On Tuesday, November 2, 1920, in the first election held after the end of World War I and the first election after the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment, Republican Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio defeated Democratic Governor James M. Cox of Ohio. The population of Topeka was estimated at 50,000 at that time.

It is during this time that the leaders of CPCC came together and decided to put pen to paper and build the new building that is now the current building that we reside in here at 1535 SW Clay St. I might note that the estimated average weekly earnings were somewhere in the neighborhood of \$33.00 per week.

They listened to God's leading. They invested in not only the present, but the future of God's Kingdom and in 1922 CPCC opened the doors to this building. The results just 11 years later are illustrated in the pictures shown above which are dated in 1931.

There are approximately 95 men in the top picture and more than 250 men, women and children in the bottom picture.

Without the planners, dreamers and investors in 1920 we could not see the big picture in 1931.

People, it isn't over! It's just a new beginning for a new body of believers. Please continue to dream, plan and invest. This building is surrounded daily by people who are lost, hurting, broken and dying - not just a physical death but an eternal death. The cure is not in property, people or programs. The cure is in the PERSON OF JESUS CHRIST. Please let your neighbor know why you have hope and with WHOM you have hope. Let's begin to plan, dream and invest in creating the next picture for my office wall.

### MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT: The Salvation Army

The Salvation Army of Topeka (TSA) has a rich history in the Topeka Community. Our stellar reputation dates back to 1886 when the first recorded address was 409 E. 3rd Street. In 1897, the Topeka police wanted to assist with the many sick people in the town, and the TSA obtained permission to rent a few rooms at a hospital. In 1919, plans were created for a campaign to erect a three-story building for a citadel, as a memorial to the ex-service men of World War I. The building was finished at a cost of \$65,000, to house all departments of the Army's work at 5th and Quincy (66608). In 2001 we had a capital campaign to build the facility we are housed in today at 1320 SE 6th Street.

Recently we established the 3-Shields Boxing Academy Program. This program serves as a platform to teach participants self-control, management of emotions and aggression, the importance of physical fitness, and then the basic skills of boxing. We offer six, 8-week sessions. We ask students to commit to the eight-week session and attend as many as possible so they can see improvement of their skills and physical stamina. The 3-Shields Boxing Academy Program hours are Monday and Thursdays 5:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. and Saturdays 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. This program can serve as an entryway into the amateur boxing realm if desired. All boxing lessons will begin with prayer said by an officer or soldier with the Salvation Army. There is no charge and the program is open to any and all youth from all schools.

Boxing has a multitude of benefits for people from all walks of life regardless of age, generation and physical ability. At the 3-Shields Boxing Academy Program we would like to leverage our boxing program in many different ways not only for the elite athlete, but also for the mother of two who needs a stress reliever or the senior citizen with Parkinson's. We can eventually include the veterans with PTSD and collaborate with our Supportive Services for Vets program.

On December 21st, the planets Jupiter and Saturn aligned in a way that they hadn't in roughly eight hundred years. The media (in a surprisingly positive turn for once) dubbed this conjunction the "2020 Christmas Star." I'm not sure any of those involved with hanging that particular name on this astronomical event really understood how fitting and necessary it would be.



God sent the original Star of Bethlehem to light the way for those who sought the newborn Savior two thousand years ago. It wasn't only a signal, it was also a beacon of hope, a symbol of promise. ## Pray for the Persecuted

### EGYPT: Dura's Story

When Dura was born, her father abandoned the family because he did not want another daughter. Later, her mother blamed her for the family's troubles and left Dura in the care of her grandmother while she worked abroad. One night, Dura had a dream about a white building with a cross on top. When she began drawing pictures of the cross, her grandmother, a devout Muslim, sent her to a mosque for "treatment".

Tragically, she was abused by an imam at the mosque, she was only 13. The abuse continued when her grandmother died and her mother returned to care for her. Still, Dura was drawn to Christ and eventually placed her faith in Him through the witness of a Coptic priest.

At age 21, Dura's mother arranged for her to marry a Muslim man. Dura's husband also abused her and later divorced her, refusing to let her see their son; a court ruled that she had no parental right because she was a Christian.

Dura's church family has brought her great comfort and encouragement. Her church has provided housing for her. VOM has helped provide for her medical needs and has also furnished an apartment for her. Because of the support Dura has received, her mother has realized that God is taking care of her. She moved in with Dura when she got sick, but Dura has been unable to find a job because of her own health issues and Christian faith. Dura continues to pray for the salvation of her family.

Please pray for Dura, and pray that her mother and family will come to faith in Jesus Christ.
